ILLINOIS CHAMBER OF COMMERCE'S MOTION FOR LEAVE TO FILE AMICUS CURIAE BRIEF IN SUPPORT OF PETITION FOR LEAVE TO APPEAL OF PETITIONER GRAIN BELT EXPRESS LLC

Illinois Chamber of Commerce ("the Chamber") respectfully requests leave to

file an amicus curiae brief in support of the petition for leave to appeal filed by

Petitioner Grain Belt Express LLC ("GBX") because of the importance that petition

presents to the Chamber and its many members. In support, the Chamber states:

1. On August 8, 2024, the Fifth District issued its order in this case, reversing the Illinois Commerce Commission's decision to grant GBX a certificate of public convenience and necessity pursuant to the Public Utilities Act. 2014 IL App (5th) 230271-U. GBX sought the certificate to construct, operate, and maintain the Illinois portion of a multi-state project to create a high voltage direct current transmission line and related facilities. Id., ¶ 7. The project is set to originate in Ford County, Kansas, then traverse the remainder of Kansas into Missouri, cross Missouri into Illinois, travel approximately 207 miles through Pike, Scott, Greene, Macoupin, Montgomery, Christian, Shelby, Cumberland, and Clark Counties, where it will ultimately cross into Indiana. Id., ¶¶ 8-9. The transmission line's approximate length is expected to be 800 miles and interconnect multiple regional electric grids including Southwest Power Pool (SPP), Midcontinent Independent System Operator (MISO), Associated Electrical Cooperative, Inc. (AECI), and PJM Interconnection, LLC (PJM). Id., ¶ 8.

2. The Fifth District reversed the Commission's conclusion that GBX "is capable of financing the proposed construction without significant adverse financial consequences for the utility or its customers." *Id.*, ¶¶ 17, 25 (citing 220 ILCS 5/8-406.1(f)(3)). The Fifth District interpreted "capable of financing" to require GBX to establish it possessed all necessary financing prior to receiving the certificate from the Commission. *Id.*, ¶ 28.

3. On October 3, 2024, GBX filed a petition for leave to appeal, arguing that this Court should review the Fifth District's decision.

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4. The Chamber has a direct interest in this matter because of the significant questions raised by the underlying decision, and the critical need of our members to ensure that the necessary infrastructure exists in Illinois for them to have access to reliable sources of affordable electricity.

WHEREFORE, the Illinois Chamber of Commerce respectfully requests this Court grant it leave to file the *amicus* brief attached to this motion.

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INTERESTS OF THE AMICUS CURIAE

The Illinois Chamber of Commerce ("the Chamber") is an association that focuses on improving Illinois' business climate. The Chamber has a strong interest in this case because of the critical need of our members to ensure that the necessary infrastructure exists in Illinois to guarantee that they have access to reliable sources of affordable electricity.

Since its inception in 1919, the Chamber has been the unifying voice of the business community in Illinois. The Chamber has more than 1,800 members in virtually every sector of the business community, including retailers and wholesalers, manufacturers, chemical producers, refineries, and construction companies, among others, as well as members who operate in every segment of the energy sector. It advocates on behalf of its members to achieve an optimal business environment that enhances job creation and economic growth. It also regularly files *amicus curiae* briefs in cases before this Court that, like this one, raise issues of importance to the State's business community. The Court has acknowledged the value of the Chamber's perspective in explaining the impact of rulings on the Illinois business community by granting the Chamber leave to file *amicus* briefs in many cases.

Left unaddressed, the Fifth District's decision in this case will have an adverse impact on the business community, including slowing the development of energy infrastructure projects, which in turn would impact electricity reliability and affordability. This, in turn, would imperil the attraction of new

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businesses to Illinois who will demand reliable sources of affordable electricity before committing to our State.

In short, the Chamber has a significant interest in the grant of GBX's Petition for Leave to Appeal and can provide this Court with insights on the effects of this case on parties other than the named litigants.

ARGUMENT

This Court Should Grant GBX's Petition for Leave to Appeal Because It Raises Critical Issues Concerning the Development of Energy Infrastructure Projects, As Well As the Ability of Illinois to Attract New Business Who Depend Upon Reliable, Affordable Electricity.

This Court should grant GBX's petition for leave to appeal because of the significant impact this matter will have on Illinois' business community.

In this case, the Fifth District reversed the Illinois Commerce Commission's decision to grant GBX a certificate of public convenience and necessity pursuant to the Public Utilities Act. 2024 IL App (5th) 230271-U. GBX sought the certificate to construct, operate, and maintain the Illinois portion of a multi-state project to create a high voltage direct current transmission line and related facilities. Id., ¶ 7. The project is set to originate in Ford County, Kansas, then traverse the remainder of Kansas into Missouri, cross Missouri into Illinois, travel approximately 207 miles through Pike, Scott, Greene, Macoupin, Montgomery, Christian, Shelby, Cumberland, and Clark Counties, where it will ultimately cross into Indiana. The Fifth District disagreed with the Commission's conclusion that GBX "is capable of financing the proposed construction without significant adverse financial consequences for the utility or its customers." *Id.*, ¶¶ 17, 25 (citing 220 ILCS 5/8-406.1(f)(3)). The Fifth District interpreted "capable of financing" to require GBX to establish it possessed all necessary financing prior to receiving the certificate from the Commission. *Id.*, ¶ 28.

The Fifth District's decision raises significant questions about this State's ability to develop the necessary infrastructure to ensure businesses' access to reliable sources of affordable electricity. Illinois is in the midst of an energy transition that will have enormous impacts not just on the way we generate electricity, but how that electricity makes its way to members of the Illinois Chamber that depend on its reliability and affordability.

In 2021, Illinois became the first state in the Midwest to mandate a clean energy future when it enacted the Climate and Equitable Jobs Act (Public Act 102-662). See 20 ILCS 3855/1-129. Through the Climate and Equitable Jobs Act, Illinois established a plan to completely decarbonize its energy sector by 2050 in an equitable manner. Id. Chamber members are currently planning to address their short, medium, and long-term electricity needs as energy markets continue to adjust to the energy transition embodied in the Climate and Equitable Jobs Act. Unsurprisingly, this planning would be significantly

complicated if the ability of Illinois to develop the necessary infrastructure becomes uncertain or is substantially delayed.

Beyond the challenges with planning, Chamber members also stand to lose millions of dollars in electricity costs if Illinois cannot develop the needed infrastructure. Whether it is due to the requirements contained within the Climate and Equitable Jobs Act, the increasing cost of regulatory compliance, or the realities of aging coal-fired generation, existing electric generating assets are going offline and will need to be replaced by a host of different sources of generation. If that generation is not developed, or the ability to transport that electricity is delayed, Illinois businesses will face extraordinarily increased costs to maintain their operations as they are forced to pay for electricity in a market that has tightened because of Illinois' and others failure to successfully manage the aforementioned energy transition.

Finally, the Chamber is an eager supporter of the State's efforts to attract new business to Illinois. Data centers, quantum, and artificial intelligence businesses are being courted by states throughout the country, and decisions are being made now regarding where best to locate. These decisions are certainly made on a host of factors, but for businesses that utilize significant amounts of electricity, reliable, affordable electricity is critical. The Chamber is concerned with the impact this matter may have on energy infrastructure as this is a critical factor in attracting new businesses to Illinois.

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Key decisions are being made now by Chamber members to ensure the continued flow of reliable and affordable electricity, and potential new members are weighing these very same issues as they consider where to make millions, if not billions, of dollars in investments. The Chamber believes it is of paramount importance to the business climate in Illinois to have the Court accept this appeal and provide clarity on a matter that will have such a wideranging impact on Illinois' business climate.

CONCLUSION

For these reasons, the Illinois Chamber of Commerce requests that this Court grant GBX's Petition for Leave to Appeal.
